Playdough Fun

- Set up a playdough station with cookie cutters, rolling pins, and other fun tools. Playdough encourages creativity and fine motor skills.

Rainy Day Sensory Bottles

- Create sensory bottles with glitter, water, and small objects that can be shaken. These bottles can mimic the sound and sight of rain and can be used to engage kids in quiet time activities.

Cooking or Snack Time

- If you have the space and the necessary safety equipment, involve the children in making a simple snack, like decorating cookies or assembling fruit kabobs. This hands-on activity can teach counting and following directions.

Interactive Reading
